James Alexander Campbell entered the army at the age of 21 for a 3 year term beginning in the fall of 1862 until mid-1865. He served valiantly until the end of the Civil War receiving two medals for bravery. On January 22nd 1865 while James was a private, he rescued his commanding officer at Woodstock Virginia and on April 5th 1865 he captured 2 battle flags at

Amelia Courthouse in VA. inscription: ... voluntarily rushed back with one companion while his command was retreating before superior numbers and rescued his commanding officer who had been unhorsed and left behind at Woodstock Virginia:1

Records show that James enlisted for the 1st time at age 20 on April 23 1861 at Kings County NY in Co F New York 13th Infantry Regiment on April 23 1861 and mustered out on August 6th 1861 at Brooklyn NY and then re-enlisted age 21 in Co A New York 2nd Cavalry Regiment on September 8th 1862 then mustered out on June 5th 1865 at Alexandria Virginia (as stated).

James and Martha moved to Montana about 1880 and had 5 children there, Philip (July 1882), Helen S (July 1884), Minnie R. (February 1886), Alma W (August 31 1890-March 19 1980), and Blanche I (October 31 1892-Nov 19 1987).\*4 The 1900 census shows they moved to Minnesota and lived at Fort Snelling until James death in 1904. \*2

He was buried at Arlington Cemetery in Virginia and when Martha died in 1943 she was buried beside him.\*4
