Robert Joseph Pruden, son of Lawrence and Marlys (Gitzen) Pruden, was born in St. Paul, Minnesota, on September 9, 1949. He was the second-oldest in a family of 13 children.<sup>1</sup> He enjoyed sports and played baseball, football and hockey.<sup>2</sup>

He graduated from Harding High School in 1967 and aspired "to make a difference in Vietnam."<sup>3</sup> He enlisted in the U.S. Army.

## Vietnam War

**Early Years** 

Robert completed the Non-Commissioned Officer Indoctrination Course at Harmony Church, Fort Benning, Georgia, in Class 2-69, 72<sup>nd</sup> Company, graduating on 8 October 1968. He then completed Ranger training at Fort Benning and Dahlonega, Georgia, before reporting for duty with G/75<sup>th</sup> Infantry (Rangers).<sup>4</sup>

In November 1969 at the age of 20, Staff Sergeant Pruden was on a reconnaissance mission with the 75<sup>th</sup> Ranger Infantry Regiment (Airborne), Americal Division. Under threat in enemy territory, he left his concealed position to divert attention from his five team members. Suffering several gunshot wounds, Pruden directed his team to an evacuation helicopter before he died from his injuries.<sup>5</sup>

For his actions, Robert was awarded the Medal of Honor. The citation reads:

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. S/Sgt. Pruden, Company G, distinguished himself while serving as a reconnaissance team leader during an ambush mission. The 6-man team was inserted by helicopter into enemy controlled territory to establish an ambush position and to obtain information concerning enemy

movements. As the team moved into the preplanned area, S/Sgt. Pruden deployed his men into 2 groups on opposite sides of a well used trail. As the group were establishing their defensive positions, 1 member of the team was trapped in the open by the heavy fire from an enemy squad. Realizing that the ambush position had been compromised, S/Sgt. Pruden directed his team to open fire on the enemy force. Immediately, the team came under heavy fire from a second enemy element. S/Sgt. Pruden, with full knowledge of the extreme danger involved, left his concealed position and, firing as he ran, advanced toward the enemy to draw the hostile fire. He was seriously wounded twice but continued his attack until he fell for a third time in front of the enemy position. S/Sgt. Pruden's actions resulted in several enemy casualties and withdrawal of the remaining enemy force. Although grievously wounded, he directed his me into defensive position and called for evacuation helicopters, which safely withdrew the members of the team. S/Sgt. Pruden's outstanding courage, selfless concern for the welfare of his men, and intrepidity in action at the cost of his life were in keeping with the highest tradition of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his Unit, and the United States Army. <sup>6</sup>


On April 22, 1971, President Richard Nixon awarded the Medal of Honor to Robert's family. His mother, father, five brothers and seven sisters were present at the private ceremony in the White House Blue Room.<sup>7</sup>

In addition to the Medal of Honor, Robert was awarded a Bronze Star and two Purple Hearts. He was an inaugural inductee to the U.S. Army Ranger Hall of Fame at Fort Benning, GA; the Army Rangers award the Pruden Trophy to the winner of its annual fitness challenge. Pruden Hall at Kelly Barracks, a U.S. military installation in Germany, is also named after him.<sup>8</sup>

# Gravestone

Robert is buried at Fort Snelling National Cemetery in Minneapolis, Minnesota.
